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Philosophy of "Right to Read"

Expect that most children can learn to read and write. Learn what the child can do and build on these strengths. Encourage a child to explore, make discoveries, learn from mistakes, and believe in his or her own abilities.

To provide an environment where Literacy Tutors provide invaluable support and enrichment to students by:

1. offering individual attention
2. engaging children in enjoyable experiences with literature (reading, listening and discussing)
3. helping children feel successful by giving positive feedback and support

"Right to Read"

Reading is the basis for learning and school success. While reading is learned primarily in the classroom, many students need extra time and help. Children who struggle with reading in the early grades are at risk of falling behind their peers in all other subjects. Low readers are likely to lack confidence and self-esteem both in and out of school. Research shows that tutoring is a great way for individuals to support learning. By spending a few hours a week giving extra support by listening, encouraging, challenging, sharing activities and reviewing reading skills Literacy Tutors can help support children's learning.

Literacy tutors do not have to be experts in reading and writing. **No experience is necessary, all training is provided.**

Why are Tutoring Programs Needed?

4 out of 10 children in kindergarten through grade three are at-risk in terms of literacy development.
